A sense of disappointment also rose in my heart, when I thought that there would be no more sisters in the office, and no more familiar and symbolic characters whom we greet everyday, which had been so natural and usual in the past. No wonder some girls called me "Sister", and a girl even asked why I didn't dress like Sr. Virginia. So, in their young mind, "Principal" equals "Sister".

Canossian education emphasizes much on "Formation of Heart". What people treasure most in St. Marians is the beauty of our heart - our dedication, our charity, humility, faithfulness and generosity. This is the core value of the school mission and is actually the most meaningful element of education. We are all fruits of Canossian education. Let us continue to cherish our tradition, which our beloved Canossian sisters have built up over the century.

As I turn to a new page of my career, new challenges and responsibilities are waiting for me. I have to go back to the beginning, to learn like a child. Really, there are lots for me to learn, to listen, to see and to reflect everyday.

PSA News - Joint Action Against the Bars Outside St. Mary's

The School (both SMCC and SMCS), the two Parent-teacher Associations and PSA are joining hands in fighting against the proliferation of bars and karaokes in the vicinity of Austin Avenue and Kimberley Road. Girls of earlier vintage may recall that the School's neighbourhood had always been a quiet residential district. However, in recent years, there has been an incremental proliferation of bars and karaokes. We consider that we need to air our objection to such establishments.



Between September 2006 and February 2007, three establishments have applied to the Liquor Licensing Board (酒牌局) for liquor licences. We have lodged objection to

all three cases. Apart from submitting our grounds for objection in writing, we also attended the Board's public hearing to air our concerns. Whether our objection would be successful remains to be seen, but this will likely be a lengthy battle, given the large number of bars in the area.

PSA News - Upgrading the School's History Archive

Together with the School and the SMCC Parent-teacher Association, we are continuing our efforts to upgrade the School's History Archive, which is located on Level 4 of the Magdalene Building. Teachers' News - Mr. Geoffrey Oliver

Mr. Oliver is more than an English teacher. He is an icon. Yes, he is the icon of drama in St. Mary's. In the past two decades, he has led St. Marians to produce some 20 drama and musicals, most of which were large-scale performances involving hundreds of girls. It is no exaggeration to say that no other school in Hong Kong have been able to match this record of annual or biennial drama productions.

Mr. Oliver was visiting his brother, who was with the British Army, when he first came to Hong Kong in 1979. Having fallen in love with this vibrant city, he decided to stay a little longer and thus joined St. Mary's as a supply English teacher. This stay subsequently turned out to be a 27-year stay, during which Mr. Oliver continued to teach English Language and Drama in St. Mary's.

Girls called him "Lo-ban" (老闆). He was their teacher, mentor, role model, and as the name "Lo-ban" suggests, their boss in their drama ventures. He inspired in them the invincible will to do the best and be the best; he injected in them the daring spirit to dream the impossible dream and to reach the unreachable star; he showed them the power of determination, the beauty of one's own creation, the mighty spirit of teamwork and cooperation........Had it not been for the drama productions, which allowed no room for "don't-knows" or "can't-dos", the girls would not have imagined that they could, with their own hands, build a 20' tall Noah's Ark on stage, or make fancy Egyptian costumes, or compose lovely music pieces. "You Can Do It!" That's what he told the girls, one generation after another.

It is not surprising that people wonder how he would spend his time in Kent in Southeast England after his retirement, having devoted practically all his time in drama in St. Mary's since the 1980s. "I would likely continue with my creative writing and drama productions, perhaps with a local drama group in his hometown, and may also assist in language and drama training in UK schools."

Well, we do have some good news. The Past Students' Association is now working on an arrangement whereby Mr. Oliver will be able to continue his drama in St. Mary's. If everything works well, we may begin to see his drama again in the spring of 2008!!

School News - Heritage Buildings in SMCC

The St. Michael Building & the Main Building of St. Mary's have been included in the list of Grade II Historic Buildings in Hong Kong (i.e. buildings of special merit, and efforts should be made to preserve them selectively.) Only 4 secondary schools are on the list. The other 3 are King's College, King George V School & St. Stephen's College, Stanley. Another 8 schools are on the Grade III list.

Some interesting information related to the two buildings:

- The St. Michael Building, formerly known as the Chatham Road Building, was built in 1924. It was originally a 2-storey building, and the top floor was added a few years later. For 83 years, the building has served as classrooms for St. Marians.
- The Main Building was built in 1930, first with the left wing (i.e. up to the General Office). The right wing was subsequently added to the building in 1935, so as to provide more classrooms and special rooms for St. Marians.





• Before 1953, the chapel was located on the 1st floor of the Main Building, and the current chapel was the School's gymnasium. The gym was moved to the current location when the School Hall complex was completed in 1953. The chapel was then relocated to the present site, and has provided shelter for the mind and soul of thousands of St. Marians ever since.

Heritage Building at the Canossian Headquarters on Caine Road



The Sacred Heart Chapel, which is located at the Canossian Headquarters on Caine Road, is also on the list of Grade II historic buildings. The chapel, built in 1907, is celebrating its 100th birthday. However, due to the presence of termites, its roof collapsed. The cost for the restoration works is around HK\$10 million. To date, friends, students and alumnae of Canossian schools have donated about \$7 million.

So far, St. Marians have been the largest source of donors among all Canossian schools. The Provincial Superior, Sr. Anna Maria Kwan, has expressed her deepest gratitude to St. Marians for their generosity and love. As further donation is needed to enable the restoration works to continue, we appeal to your generous support for the cause. Please see page 8 of this newsletter regarding the donation details.

And their parents just could not do anything when confronted with their children's innocent questioning eyes.

The girls were moved. They were determined to do something to answer these children's questions. Today, the children are still asking, they are just asking for a chance.

Loveweaver is a student group formed by St. Marians who wish to raise the awareness of other girls towards the underprivileged children in the Mainland, and to raise money to help these children enjoy quality education through exhibition and fund-raising activities.
